CAT CHAT THE MYSTERIOUS CAT: MYTHS and MYSTERIES by Roz Goldstein

Have you ever wondered whether the cute fur-ball next to you on the sofa was really an alien or a magician? Why have cats through the ages been regarded as mysterious beings? Here we will journey through some common myths and try to answer some of these questions.

Many stories (I have read most) tell of

Cats have nine lives

cats coming back in their next life. This came about because of the cats seemingly uncanny ability to survive obstacles. Cats are very agile due to the way their skeletal system is structured. Their shoulder blades are not attached giving them the ability to twist in mid jump. Also they are able to squeeze through very tight spaces. These abilities, along with a great sense of balance, allow cats to jump down from amazing heights and still land on their feet. Of course, many do not avoid impact injury or even death when falling from great heights. The ability to squeeze through small spaces has helped cats to escape from danger. This has also allowed them to get caught in precarious situations. I had a cat that got into walls and ceilings. They are not infallible and surely do not have more than one life.

Black Cats are bad luck

This myth has hurt the adoption of many black cats and kittens. This may have started in the past when cats were demonized and came to be associated with witches. Of course coming upon a black cat crossing your path in the dark may lead to an accident. The cat is as likely as you to get injured. In fact, the black cat has been associated with good luck as well. Sailors had a preference for black ship cats as they were good hunters in the dark cargo holds of the ships. In Japan, a black cat crossing your path is associated with good luck and benevolence. All in all, black cats are as affectionate and comforting as any other cat. Black cats as witches companions

Every Halloween we see the inevitable images of the spooky black cat. Why "spooky"? Imagine (as some of us have experienced) walking down a path with a lantern. You shine this ahead and a black cat, which has blended in with his surroundings, suddenly appears with glowing yellow eyes. To top it off, she hisses at you not knowing who you are. Certainly a "spooky" situation. Now put that together with the feline association with witches. These women, mostly widowed without families or single, were often midwives and herbal healers, sometimes collecting herbs into the dusk. These women were outliers of the community and so in a superstitious society, the first to bear the brunt of suspicion during a community problem. They were probably animal helpers and the first "cat ladies". No, the cat was not her magical familiar, just an animal she helped.

Cats see in the dark

Many think of a cat as nocturnal and capable of seeing in the dark. This is associated with some of the myths we have explored. In fact, cats are "corpuscular". This means they prowl and hunt at dusk and dawn. Their sight has evolved to suit these low light periods. Firstly, their pupils open from side to side, unlike our own which are round. This allows the pupil to open fully allowing more light to enter the eye. When there is an abundance of light, their pupils close, giving a cat a sliteyed appearance. In addition, the back of their pupils have a reflective surface called the "tapetum lucidum". This gives their eyes the ability to magnify any small bit of light. This reflective layer is what gives cats' eyes that appearance of glowing in the dark. But, of course, they, like all animals, cannot see in total darkness. This dawn and dusk hunting rhythm is why your cat is awake and active and wants to eat and play at 4 or 5am.

Cats are unsocial and can do better alone

Those of us who have cared for cats for many years know this to be untrue. Many people really believe this and so either disdain cat contact or even neglect them. Cats that have had early contact with people are very sociable. (I have one sitting next to me as I write this.) Often even cats that have had minimal human contact will bond over time with one person. Our cats are one of the household pets who were domesticated later than dogs and still do have some wildness. This is why they have appeal. It does not mean they are unsocial. They also do bond with other household pets, dogs or cats. Some of this allusion to unsociability is connected to the cat's innate behavior patterns. They consider themselves to be both hunter and prey. The hunter part allows them to develop play patterns with us. The prey part leads to hiding and withdrawal if they feel threatened. People that chase a cat to hold them, or hold them too tightly, force them to sit on a lap, or corner them, will find the cat withdrawing or even hiding or scratching. This is because the human behavior, no matter how well intentioned, feels threatening to a cat. Cats need patience to allow them to express their affection in a way acceptable to them. Cats living within a household are used to our care. They cannot care for themselves if abandoned. They also do need some human affection, play. and attention. These are essential to a well behaved, confident cat.

Cats are picky eaters

Anyone who has cared for cats, jokes about cats being picky eaters. Perhaps there are many cats that have preferences or are unsatisfied with their food options. After all, they do not choose their own food. One of the reasons some cats may smell, walk away, then come back or wait until other cats have eaten (I have all of these types at home) is that in the wild, those that are most cautious live to see another day. Food can be spoiled or tainted. If it smells wrong, they may not eat it. They do have a sensitive sense of smell. Of course, the scent of food is what may most appeal to the cat. "The smellier the better". Yes, smelly tuna has great appeal but if it is spoiled or tainted (i.e. containing some medications) it will be spurned. Make sure the food is fresh. One note is that in changing foods, go slowly. Mixing new food little by little with an accepted food will help the food to increase its appeal.


