Recently, he seemed to be feeling a bit down, so Dr. Mike checked out his mouth and discovered abscesses on his gums causing considerable pain. Our wonderful volunteers, **Dave and Anita Butler**, offered to take William up to the new state-of-the-art Veterinary Emergency dentist **Dr. Jean Joo**, in Walpole, MA. William had a cardiology exam, X-Rays, and surgery to remove 8 teeth. X-Rays discovered a badly injured and healed leg which caused him to walk like a cowboy. Probably he had been hit by a car which caused him to leave his feeding station on Pearl Street and recover under Jan's condo a few blocks distant. Your donations have made it possible for us to take William for his extensive work-up. His recovery has been slower than we like but has been helped by chicken broth cooked by **Pat Franzese** and all the love sent his way. Everybody who comes in contact with him falls for him, as have we. Our William, has found his forever home at CASAS where he reigns benevolently, with honor and distinction - and at last he has a name.

Timothy and Leo to Marcia Trella



BENEFITS OF ADOPTING AN ADULT CAT

1. Adopting a mature cat is less maintenance. You do not have to go through the demanding and time-consuming stage of raising a kitten
2. Adult cats are independent and do not need anyone home with them during the day.
3. Adult cats are usually litter-box trained and are more likely to have some basic training.
4. You know what the cat will look like or how big it will be.
5. Adult cats are more likely to have already been sterilized and fully vaccinated. (Although our kittens are also).
6. Adult cats are eager to please their owners and understand the concept of approval and reward.
7. Many adult cats come from previous homes and are usually well versed at being a good pet.
8. Adult cats get into less mischief and you do not need to "kitten-proof" your home.
9. Older cats are less rambunctious and may be a better choice for seniors and small children.

CASAS always has well-behaved adult cats just yearning for their special person. Come and spend some time in our no pressure, cageless shelter. We supply cats just perfect for brushing or play-time.

VOLUNTEERS to sit, comb, brush, socialize. No heavy lifting, scooping or feeding necessary unless you want. Willing to commit on a regular basis to a few hours a week to prepare our residents for adoption. We need someone who can commit to a regular morning @7-8 AM to feed, scoop, clean and/or someone to come on a regular basis @ 7 PM to sit and socialize with the cats so the night is not so long for them. We also need people to volunteer at special events, especially during Pet Appreciation Weekend which is always the last full weekend in September. We also need people who can stay at the shelter to answer phones and welcome visitors while we are out on errands, trapping, or on vet runs.

By purchasing this license plate, you will be contributing to a statewide program that directly benefits Massachusetts animals. The initial cost of this "I'm Animal Friendly" license plate is \$40; \$28 of which will be used to help fund this statewide spay/neuter program. The remaining \$12 is a one-time only cost to cover the manufacturing of the plate. Upon renewal, the entire \$40 will go to this spay/neuter program. Funds received from the sale of these special license plates are dispersed annually by MAC through a grant process. These funds are awarded to non-profit humane organizations and municipal animal control agencies in the Commonwealth that provide spaying and neutering services for cats, dogs and rabbits.
